HOMELAND SECURITY AND DEFENSE STUDIES

NHSD4001 *Fundamentals of Homeland Security and Homeland Defense:*

An overview of U.S. Homeland Security strategies, objectives, and key interagency participants while exploring the impact on current global affairs, U.S. foreign policy, wars and foreign affairs challenges in the Middle East and Central Asia, and upon American civil liberties.

NHSD4002 *Asymmetric Threats to Global Security:*

Introduction to transnational, asymmetric warfare as conducted by terror organizations such as al Qaeda, Hamas and Hezbollah and examines asymmetric threats to critical infrastructure and key resources.

NHSD4003 *Law & Intelligence in Homeland Security and Homeland Defense:*

Analyzes the Intelligence Community with respect to organization, operational capabilities and funding. Among other legislation, examines the USA PATRIOT Act of 2001, including its provisions and empowerments regarding law enforcement, the intelligence community, and American civil liberties.

NHSD4004 *The Interagency and Homeland Security and Homeland Defense:*

Explains the concept of U.S. government interagency and examines several interagencies that are key to effective homeland security and defense mission coordination and mutual support.

NHSD4001 *Fundamentals of Homeland Security and Homeland Defense:*

An overview of U.S. Homeland Security strategies, objectives, and key interagency participants while exploring the impact on current global affairs, U.S. foreign policy, wars and foreign affairs challenges in the Middle East and Central Asia, and upon American civil liberties.

NHSD4005 *Immediate Information, Strategic Communications & U.S. Foreign Policy:*

Examines the challenges the U.S. experiences regarding its capability to affect timely, accurate, and credible global communication to combat and defeat terrorism.

NHSD4006 *The Genesis & Sustainment of Terror Organizations:*

Examines the creation, evolution, modus operandi and political savvy of major terrorist organizations and how they raise money, recruit, plan, and conduct operations, exploit the Internet, and work from within traditional political structures to gain and maintain public support.

NHSD4007 *Comparative Approaches to Homeland Security and Homeland Defense:*

Examines, compares, and assesses the effectiveness of homeland security and defense strategies employed by democracies worldwide and applies lessons learned to the organizational, operational, and functional challenges faced by homeland security leaders, first responders, and U.S. citizens.

TRANSNATIONAL TERROR STUDIES

NHSD4002 *Asymmetric Threats to Global Security:*

Introduction to transnational, asymmetric warfare as conducted by terror organizations such as al Qaeda, Hamas and Hezbollah and examines asymmetric threats to critical infrastructure and key resources.

NHSD4006 *The Genesis & Sustainment of Terror Organizations:*

NHSD4008 *Terror Attacks: Psychological Effects and Management of Fear:*

An in-depth analysis of the psychological effects of terror attacks upon populations and of the devastating and permanent effects that mass casualty terror attacks have on entire communities.

NHSD4009 *Terror Organizations and their Participation in the Political Process:*

Examines how terror organizations can morph into legitimate political entities and how they need to maintain public and international support by entering into and competing within a nation state's political process.

Tuition is \$395 per course plus a \$15 technology fee.

Successful completion of each course awards 1.2 Continuing Education Units (CEUs) on your official
