

Christina M. Jiménez is an Associate Professor in History at University of Colorado, Colorado Springs, where she began teaching in 2000. She also teaches for the Ethnic Studies and Women's Studies programs and chairs the Faculty Minority Affairs Committee, a standing committee of the UCCS Representative Faculty Assembly. A native of California, Jiménez earned her PhD in Latin American History from the University of California, San Diego, 2001. Her research explores the changing relationship between Mexican citizens and government from 1850 to 1950 and the related issues of citizenship, modernity, urbanization, civic identity, and public space in Mexican cities. She has been a Research Fellow at the Shelby Cullom Davis Center for Historical Studies, Princeton University, and at the Center for Cultural Studies at the University of California, Santa Cruz. Her research has appeared in Urban History and the Journal of Urban History as well as collected volumes. She is also co-editor of The Matrix Reader: Examining the Dynamics of Oppression and Privilege (forthcoming McGraw-Hill Co.), an introductory reader on the intersecting issues of race, class, gender, and sexuality.
