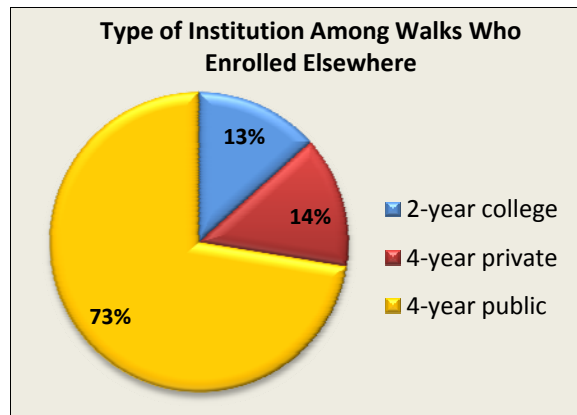


Fall 2009 Walks

Every semester there are admitted students who do not enroll. We refer to these students as “walks” because they walk away from UCCS. According to the National Student Clearinghouse, 74% (2,000 of 2,714) of our walks enrolled at another institution.

Among the walks who enrolled elsewhere, the majority (73%) did so at four-year public institutions. Approximately 14% enrolled at four-private institutions and the remaining 13% enrolled at two-year colleges.

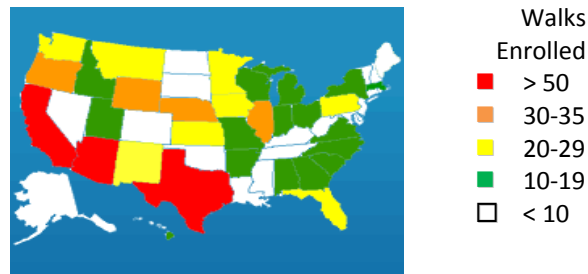


About 40% applied as out-of-state students, either non-resident or WUE. Approximately 80% applied as freshmen, 15% as transfers, 3% as graduate students, and the remaining 2% as non-degree students.

Nearly 60% of the subsequently enrolled students are attending institutions in Colorado as shown in the table below.

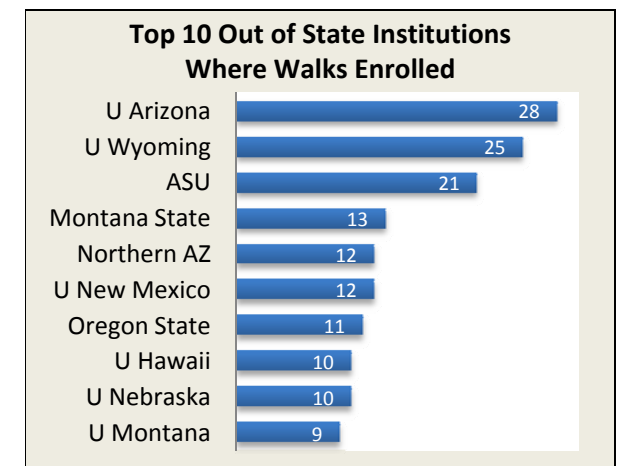

The walks attending institutions *outside* of Colorado are enrolled at 413 different institutions in 48 states (all except Maine).



Although California claims 73 walks, more than any other state, no single California institution enrolled more than 4 of our walks.

The map below identifies states by the number of walks who enrolled there. California, Arizona, and Texas gained the most from our walks. The next four states are Oregon, Illinois, Wyoming, and Nebraska. And there are a few surprises such as Pennsylvania, Florida, Washington, Iowa, and Minnesota. The top 10 out-of-state institutions are shown in the bar chart below.



Approximately 58% of the walks who enrolled elsewhere were women and 22% were students of color—proportions that are similar to our current student body. A substantial number (19%) were 20 years or older at the beginning of the Fall semester.

Overall, ¼ of the students who walk away from UCCS after being admitted here are enrolling at other reputable institutions—many of them within Colorado. The fall 2009 enrollment would have increased 1% for every 85 walks converted into UCCS students.
