Homework: Some of the homework will be done in groups in class. The rest of the homework will be done on your own at home. NO late homework will be accepted. I will drop your lowest 2 homework scores.

Exams: Three will be three exams, each worth 18.33% of your grade, plus a final exam worth 25%. The final may also count as 40% with the other 3 exams being worth 13.33% if it helps your grade. There will be no make-up exams unless extenuating circumstances exist (which must generally be scheduled ahead of time).

- All answers to homework and exam problems must be accompanied by the appropriate mathematical justification for credit to be awarded.

Grading: The course is based on conventional percentages:

Plus and minuses may also be given at the instructor's discretion. You will have 4 columns at the end of the semester, having homework count as 6% and 20%, and the final as 25% and 40%.
