Objectives:

- ◆ Political science is the study of government and the forces that shape and influence government. Political scientists study the ways in which different forms of government operate, the relationships between governments, the effects of various “inputs” on government, and the effects of government on society.
- ◆ In addition to a general political science degree, the department offers options in American Politics/Public Law, Global Politics, and Public Administration. Minors also include: General Political Science, American Politics and Public Law, Global Politics, and Public Administration.
- ◆ Political science graduates often are employed by federal, state, or local governments in a variety of roles. Graduates also work in interest groups, international organizations, non-profit organizations, journalism, business, and education. Typical graduate education options include continued study in political science, as well as law and public administration.
